Housing Authority's Newest Board Member Has Place in Baseball Museum

When the Negro Southern League Museum opened its doors next to Regions Field on Aug. 28, Charles Harris was there. He had a personal interest in the museum. The museum tells the rich history of African-American baseball in the South, and the Jefferson County Housing

Authority's newest board member is part of that history.

Harris played for Stockham Valves and Fittings in the Birmingham Industrial League from 1962 to 1972. In its heyday, from the 1920s through the 1960s, the Birmingham Industrial League fielded teams that rivaled Negro League teams and was a proving ground for players who later went on to the Negro League and Major League Baseball – the great Willie Mays among them.

During Harris' 10 years with Stockham, the team dominated the Industrial League, winning five championships. In 1965, according to the Negro Southern League Museum, Piper Davis managed the team and recruited a roster of former Birmingham Black Barons and Negro League players. That team won the league's championship.

And Harris more than held his own amid such talent. "I was a pretty good fielder," Harris said when asked about his skill as a

ballplayer. But the left-handed outfielder also handled himself well at the plate. According to stats available on the museum's website, Harris batted .390 in 1963, .363 in 1964, .385 in 1965 and .348 in 1967.

"We had a lot of talent here," Harris said. "A lot of guys played on company or neighborhood teams. That's how they got exposure. There were so many guys in Alabama

New Warrior Court Handicapped Units Completed

For Steven Cottrell, manager of the Housing Authority's Warrior communities, it's been a long wait for his two newest apartment units to be completed and ready for occupancy. But the finished product has been well worth the wait.



Because these aren't any ordinary apartments. They are the Housing Authority's newest fully accessible handicapped units.

"These are two beautiful apartments," Cottrell said of the units at Warrior Court. "Management is so happy to have these two, brand-new units soon to be available. I am very excited that we soon will be getting residents in them."

Construction on the two-unit apartment building started more than a year ago, Cottrell said. Most of the work on the

apartments has been finished for several months, but the Housing Authority has had to wait to get everything signed off and apartments approved for occupancy.

The apartments feature modern concrete wheelchair ramps, roll-in showers, low cabinets and countertops accessible to residents in wheelchairs, easily reachable light switches and under-cabinet lighting. In addition to a stove, washer and dryer hookups and central air conditioning and heating, the units have an icemaker line for the refrigerator. The units also come with outside storage rooms.



Now that the apartments are ready to be occupied, the next step is getting the final approval to begin selecting the lucky new tenants. Finding tenants shouldn't be hard. Cottrell said Warrior Court has a waiting list of applicants.

Types of apartments: One-bedroom, one-bath (486 square feet); two-bedroom, one-bath (610 square feet); three-bedroom, one-bath (685 square feet); and three-bedroom, one-and-a-half bath (734 square feet).

When built: 1985.

Community amenities: Two play areas and a community room.

Criteria for residents: Income-based affordable housing. Taking applications for two-and three-bedroom units through Oct. 1.

What's new: A Senior Companion Program; resident activities.

What makes the community special: Nestled on rolling hills featuring scenic landscapes and plenty of grassy areas and trees, Terrace Manor is close to Interstate 20/59, shopping, schools and parks.

From the manager: "From the moment you drive into our community, you will know you have found a place to call home. Terrace Manor is the community that cares."

My favorite hobby: Shopping.


What I like about my job: Everything!!

Harris said most of the big companies had teams. The Negro Southern League Museum has a display about the Birmingham Industrial League and lists on its website dozens and dozens of teams. They include such names as ACIPCO, McWane, Sloss Furnace, Connors Steel, Birmingham Pipe Shop, Englewood Iron Works, L&N Railroad, Republic Steel, Tennessee Coal & Iron, and many more.

played at Rickwood Field and other ballparks around town. But the big companies had their own baseball fields. "The field at Stockham had lights, so we played a lot of times at night," Harris said.

The Industrial Leagues games often drew thousands of fans. Sometimes, according to the Negro Southern League, they outdrew the Birmingham Barons.

A Welder

You can say baseball helped build Harris' career as a welder. "At that time, they were hiring ballplayers," Harris said of Stockham and other Industrial League teams. "I got hired because of baseball." Harris worked at Stockham for 10 years before taking a job at the Chicago Bridge & Iron Co., from which he retired.

At age 78, Harris is still active in baseball – not as a player, but as an ambassador. The Norwood native and 1956 graduate of Ullman High School is vice president of the Alabama Negro League Association. The association is a group of about 80 to 90 former players from Birmingham and around the country. The group meets each year in Birmingham, and during Black History Month, its members speak at schools about Birmingham's baseball history.

A resident of Spring Gardens for the past four years, Harris was appointed to the Housing Authority board as a resident representative. He was sworn in at the board's Aug. 24 meeting.

Harris said he will be a voice for his fellow tenants. "I am trying to get myself adjusted, but I'm looking forward to working on the board. I talk to people out here, and they tell me the things they want improved."


